

How To Look Like An From The Very First

s a whistle. And it signals the start of a game whose general aim is quite apparent: score a goal. However, nuance is the name of this game. And until you know where to look, and why, you might end up having the time of your life for all the wrong reasons.

And, of course, that won't do

Every Player Holds A Position Of Responsibility

But knowing those responsibilities is the trick. And frankly, just knowing the names of the positions can be quite a feat in itself.

Consider this: a forward, a striker and a wing are basically the same player. But different coaches use different terms. Now, when it comes to calling players names, vou'd probably like to know what you're doing. So let's start with the front line.

This decidedly offensive trio is out there, basically, to score. And they're known as the "left wing, the right wing and the center"...or as the "forwards" ... or maybe as the "strikers."

Working our way back toward the goalie, we next come to the midfield line, or the "halfbacks." These guys handle the transition from defense to offense, controlling the center of the field.

The Defense... Their Goal Is To Prevent A Goal

Between the midfield line and the goalie, we find a right back, a left back and a stopper. These guys were born to play defense. And, theoretically, they should never cross onto the offensive side of the field. In reality, though, you'll often find them moving up to fill open spaces and help press the attack. (But they'd better be back where they belong in the event of a turnover...or the coach will be calling them names you won't see printed here.)


Two other positions figure in on defense: the sweeper back and the goalie. Try to think of the sweeper back as a freelance, freespirited defensive type. He's assigned to go anyplace he's needed on defense, to lend a hand. But if his free spirit carries him all the way up to the front line, he's being a little too free ... and creating a defensive weakness.

So call him a name.

The Goalie ... Much More Than Just A Sitting Duck.

As you'll see during the game, the fellow in the net is much more than just a sitting duck. He can also be a diving duck. Or a jumping duck. (But not, we hope, a ducking duck.)

His job is to stop any ball that's shot at the goal. But there's a very real strategy to this, and that is: grab the ball! This guy's allowed to use his hands, and, unless he does, the ball is likely to keep bouncing out in front of the goal after every block, giving the offense endless chances to score.

The Offsides Penalty— **Confusing For Most Fans** (And Far Too Many Players!)

One downright frustrating way for a team to lose the ball is to have a player called offsides. And this happens when an overzealous player, looking for a chance to score, ends up speeding ahead of the ball, his team, the other team, and anything else on the field.

To make it simple: if you're heading into the opponent's territory and the ball is behind you, you should have at least two defensive players in front of you. (Their goalie counts as one defensive player.)

ous fouls, your team will get a direct the way out on the side, the other free kick. That means you'll kick it team gets to throw it back in ... from a set point on the field—with the defense in your way, of courseand if it goes straight in, it counts.

Lesser fouls earn you indirect free kicks—in which the ball has to touch someone else (friend or foe) before it goes in.

Last but not least, there's the penalty kick. This is awarded when the defense fouls an offensive player inside the penalty area: the area marked in front of the goal. Since the offense was so close to begin with, one of their players is given a free kick from a spot marked before the goal . . . with only the goalie there to try and stop it.

The goalie can't move until the ball is kicked ... so his only option is to try and second-guess the kicker. Fairly often, then, he'll end up stretched out, sailing to cover the left corner of the goal, as the ball sails cleanly into the net on the right side.

But that's not the only amusing sight in this sport. For example, if you've not seen a lot of soccer before, you'll be amazed at how thoughtlessly these fellows use their heads. See, it's perfectly legal to punch the ball around the field with your head—the move is called a header—and pulling off a precise one is simply a matter of ... uh ... clear thinking.

A Subject That's Out Of Bounds...

Those white lines on the side of the field are called touch lines. And they mark the out-of-bounds

> If the ball goes out over an end line, one of two things happens. If the offense kicked it out, the defense gets it. Play is restarted with a goal kick by the goalie, from a set location.

If the defense kicked it out, the offense restarts play with a corner kick. The ball is set at the corner on



the side it went out, and an offensive player kicks it back in. In this case, he'll usually kick toward the center or toward the goal, hoping that a teammate will be in a perfect position to drill the ball home!

And that's the game of soccer, except for a couple dozen other details that you'll likely figure out for yourself. Like ties (which are settled with a series of penalty kicks).
